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extensively illustrated this is the first accessible publication on the history of tapestry in over two decades woven with dazzling images from history mythology and the natural world and breath taking in their craftsmanship tapestries were among the most valuable and high status works of art available in europe from the medieval period to the end of the eighteenth century over 600 historic examples hang in national trust properties in england and wales the largest collection in the uk this beautifully illustrated study by tapestry expert helen wyld in association with the national trust offers new insights into these works from the complex themes embedded in their imagery to long forgotten practices of sacred significance and ritual use the range of historical mythological and pastoral themes that recur across the centuries is explored while the importance of the revival of tapestry from the late nineteenth century is considered in detail for the first time although focussed on the national trust s collection this book offers a fresh perspective on the history of tapestry across europe both the tapestry specialist and the keen art history enthusiast can find a wealth of information here about woven wall hangings and furnishings including methods of production purchase and distribution evolving techniques and technologies the changing trends of subject matter across time and how tapestries have been collected used and displayed in british country houses across the centuries

the present exhibition is one of a series of five worked out in the partnership between the metropolitan museum and the réunion des musées nationaux of france the others are nineteenth century french drawings from the metropolitan museum of art which closed at the louvre last month and is now on view here italian renaissance drawings from the louvre to be shown at the metropolitan in october impressionism which will include some forty five of the greatest paintings in the style and will be seen at the louvre in september and here in december and finally french painting from david to delacroix which is planned to open in paris in the winter of 1974 followed by showings at the detroit institute of art in the spring of 1975 and the metropolitan in the summer following its appearance at the grand palais in paris masterpieces of tapestry is presented in new york in association with and under the patronage of the national endowment for the humanities and the national endowment for the arts and under the sponsorship of mr and mrs ben heller of new york city without the extraordinary aid of the two endowments and the enlightened generosity of these two art loving private patrons the exhibition simply would not have been possible here

a colorful guided tour from an expert enabling weavers textile lovers and art lovers to notice and appreciate what tapestries can do and how they do it this guide from expert tapestry weaver and historian sidore gives how to strategies enabling weavers and nonweavers to notice and appreciate the meaning of these artworks you ll discover much to enjoy in photos of more than 300 tapestries from the 12th to the 21st centuries sidore enables you to think about the weavings in ways you have never before considered as she groups pieces that talk with each other and that also converse with the viewer enjoy learning basic elements of weaving to help you become increasingly sophisticated in understanding what you re seeing then learn six ways in which tapestries can call attention to themselves as cloth this eye opening guide to seeing explains the great range of materials and visual themes the use of trompe l oeil the importance of the direction in which the weaver weaves and more after this learning experience you ll bring smarter eyes to your museum wandering deeper enjoyment to your collection and purchases and surprising new skills and creativity to your weaving of fibers and of life

this lavishly illustrated book presents a rich variety of european tapestries from the art institute of chicago these

exquisite examples of the art of tapestry weaving include medieval renaissance and baroque works manufactured at many of the foremost workshops in the major centers of production among the pieces discussed are the annunciation a renaissance masterpiece designed by an artist in the circle of andrea mantegna the story of caesar and cleopatra a magnificent series of fourteen tapestries now attributed with certainty to justus van egmont who worked in rubens s studio autumn and winter based on designs by charles le bron and the elephant woven after a design by jean baptiste monnoyer an international team of scholars explains the history of this previously unpublished collection and offers new designer and workshop attributions design and source identifications and provenance information book jacket

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
